# Melbourne Museum & Old Melbourne Gaol Excursion

On the 6th of October 2022, both Niddrie and East Keilor year 7 classes went on an excursion for their novel study, Runner. Runner is a book about Melbourne and a boy called Charlie Feehan who falls into the path of notorious gangster Squizzy Taylor and this story takes place at the time when the Spanish Influenza pandemic ravaged the world that we stand on today, but that was back in 1919.

The year 7s departed for their journey at 8:30 am SHARP and many complained about having to rise at such an early hour. On the way, the East Keilor bus stopped to pick up a class from Niddrie and continued on the road. The bus had many students, each one making the journey more pleasant by telling jokes and card games like snap and the Pokémon trading card game. Many students thought that our arrival would be delayed due to the fact they left at the early hour of 8:30, a time where peak hour traffic is waiting, but the tables turned in their favour and traffic was flowing like water down a stream.

The bus arrived at the designated point early and the year 7s from Keilor walked a lap of the gardens of the museum and many complained about sore feet and groaned that they needed to fill in booklets about the museum's old Melbourne exhibits. Most students struggled to get info until one of the students went into the cottages and called out to the others that there were plaques with information on the walls. Around 11:43 am, the students began the journey to the Old Melbourne Gaol [and no, that is not a spelling error] ON FOOT. When they arrived at the front gates, they sat down to enjoy some well-earned lunch. Many ate

sweet and savoury snacks, whilst others that had no food due to losing and/or already eating it got some food from others who were willing to share and some who simply brought too much food [no complaints there] would supply everyone else with extra or backup food.


The Gaol had been the place of Mr Ned Kelly's death and burial. When they decommissioned the gaol, they dug up the graves and found Ned's bones. How did they know they were his? Simple. The dents in the bones from the 28 bullets shot at his arms and legs... and a DNA test. But here's the thing, some prankster thought it would be a funny joke to steal his skull and it is still missing to this day.

The women's cell block was torn down and then reconverted to a part of the university and the old cemetery, converted to a basketball court. #### **Year 9 Humanities Excursion**




