Term 3 has been another busy term which kicked off with the opening of the Essendon Arts Centre in the first week of term. It was great that we were able to perform our production, "School of Rock", in our own facility for the first time.

THE XCELLENCE

The ongoing improvement in our College facilities has continued with

the Niddrie Campus Canteen being constructed in the September holidays and with the installation of air conditioning in a number of rooms at the Niddrie Campus.

In addition the College has been allocated an additional \$260,000 for maintenance in 2019/2020 and with the addition of some College funds we will continue to improve all three campuses into the future.

Improving our facilities is important in providing a positive learning environment for students and the impact is already being felt. Our parent, student and staff survey data all show significant increases in all the variables that contribute to student learning growth. There have also been improvements in a number of the areas measured by NAPLAN, although there is still work to do in other areas.

On Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup> September we were visited by Dr Mimmie Watts as part of the Principal for a Day program. Mimmie is a strategic thinker, advocate, a public speaker and a Public Health Expert and a leader in women's health, gender health and international health. Mimmie spoke to a small group of students are the Essendon Campus empowering students to become partners in school decision making. She encouraged all students to contribute to improving their communities and discover the many opportunities available to them. Mimmie toured all three campuses and was impressed by the environment and the engagement of students in their learning.

Spring is here, at last, and we look forward to the September holidays and Term 4 when yet another year will conclude with exams, Step Up and all the end of year festivities.

### **NEW BUS TIMETABLES (JUNIOR CAMPUSES)**

As you will be aware, funding for improvements to metropolitan bus services were included in the 2018/19 Victorian State Budget, which included funding for new bus services to Valley Lake, Keilor East and Essendon Fields.

The Department of Transport are currently liaising with our Transport Unit to determine the transport and parking infrastructure changes that will need to be implemented to facilitate these new services.

The Essendon Arts Centre is now a restored 230 seat facility with state-of-the-art equipment, heating and cooling, lifts and catering facilities.









We held this year's College production 'School of Rock' in our theatre this year. It proved to be very functional performance space, having the ability rehearse in the theatre allowed our students to develop their confidence and perform brilliantly. Our final show was sold out and our students were already discussing their next performance opportunity. The Annual Music Soiree was also a very successful event, amazing performances with great support from all involved. The knowledge and skills students gain from participating in these events will be an asset to them in their future pathways. Thank you to all families who came and supported the events. Special thanks to Jarrod Mc Donald, Blair Harbrow, Diane Basile, Natasha Anicic, Richard Rocek and our instrumental music staff for their direction and support of our students. Thank you and congratulations to all students involved in the events both our amazing performers and students who were involved behind the scenes.

The Year 10 students received Mental Health First Aide training this term, the program gives teenagers the skills they need to recognise and help with mental health problems and crises in their friends, and to get the help of an adult quickly.

There have also been many rich educational experiences for students outside the classroom. The Ski Trip, visits from Universities and TAFE's, RUOK? Day and International Sister School Exchange programs are just a few of the significant events that students have participated in.

We introduced a focus on learning this term around collaboration. Collaborative learning occurs when students work in small groups and everyone participates in a learning task. There are many collaborative learning approaches. Each uses varying forms of organisation and tasks. Collaborative learning is supported by designing meaningful tasks. It involves students actively participating in negotiating roles, responsibilities and outcomes.

Our key values Respect, Engage, Aspire and Learn are there to encourage all our students to be empowered to take ownership of their learning, to make purposeful contributions to their learning environments, and to build resilience. Students need to evaluate their own learning, develop strategies to build on their knowledge and skills and work in partnership with their teachers. All students need to make time at home to reflect on their work and plan to improve their outcomes. It doesn't matter whether they are completing a year 10, VCAL or VCE course. There are many supports at school and in the community students can access to improve their outcomes. For example, every afternoon at the Essendon Campus there are staff available to support students in the library, our students studying Unit 3 and 4 subjects have access to the Melbourne University SWOT revision program in the holidays. We are also running Unit 3 and 4 practice exams in the holidays to prepare students for the upcoming exam period. (Information has been posted on Compass to all VCE students).

Our rivalry with Hallam has been a fierce one, although they hadn't beaten us since 2014 and we were looking to extend that run. The game was played in a combative and physical way where the opposition tried to unsettle the players with a stronger desire to make body contact rather than play the ball. To the boys credit they maintained their focus and applied themselves to how we wanted to play the game and in the end had a comfortable

victory with some excellent contributions from many. The best on ground for the day was again awarded to Mutaz Elnour who worked tirelessly in the ruck in trying circumstances.

Round Three: EKC 12 - 10 - 82 defeated Hallam SC 3 - 7 - 25

The players had earnt the right to host a home final after finishing on top of our side of the draw and we hosted Emmanuel College from Warrnambool with the winning side progressing to the Grand Final. The final was an intense contest where the opposition had been in contact with other schools to understand our style of play and how best to nullify it and to their credit for the early part of the game they managed to do this. The players regrouped and realised the effort and intensity required to maintain our way of playing and that mindset and output saw an impressive final three quarters where the players controlled the contest and gave us the opportunity to play in our fourth Grand Final in five years. The opportunity to play off in the Grand Final was a fantastic one for the players and they deserved it after the season they had put together.

The game was played at Trevor Barker Oval in Sandringham against Catherine McAuley College from Bendigo. They had finished on top of their side of the draw and again had a host of NAB league players and Victorian Country representatives playing and were a very strong side.

The players started the game well and matched the intensity around the contest and had opportunities to score but unfortunately were unable to make the most of these. In the end this inability to apply scoreboard pressure and then being overrun by a fitter, stronger and more polished side led to a disappointing result and way to end what was until that stage a successful season. The best player for the day was Mason Bawden who played a key defensive role in what became a challenging part of the ground under constant pressure.

Students are able to continue to change their course preferences up until the relevant cut-off date in December. It is important that students are aware of Essential Requirements and Admission Criteria for any courses they apply for. Many students have been exploring scholarship opportunities and applying for special consideration (SEAS) due to difficult circumstances.

### VTAC Changes for 2019:

- ✓ Please note the new December Offer Round for Domestic students. This is new in 2019, meaning the majority of students should receive an offer before the end of the year.
- ✓ Please also note the reduced time this year between ATAR release and close of change of preference. Students only have a few days to modify and finalise their preferences after they receive their ATAR. It is crucial they have preferences ordered correctly to maximise their chances of an offer.

This year in STEM club, time has been flying past! The two major projects we took on this year was designing a STEM space and the integration of VR into the program.


