Thank you to the Essendon campus community for the warm welcome all the Year 10 students and new staff to the campus received at the start of the year. It has been an


incredibly successful term, with a range of learning experiences and opportunities availed to all our students.

# **Interschool sport**

We have had many students representing the college in interschool sports including Senior Volleyball and Senior Basketball. ## **Athletics Day**

# **Year 10 Work Experience**

After a few COVID affected years, we are looking forward to a hopefully uninterrupted work experience program this year. This year employers have been more willing to take on students, and as a result, students from EKC have been able to secure some really interesting work experience placements. Some examples of this include Melbourne University Biosciences, Australia Zoo and Monash University research.

Some students are yet to organise a placement and we encourage these students to use the school holidays to find a suitable employer. Each students' local network of family, friends and connections is often the easiest way to find a work experience placement however, there are a range of work experience resources in the Year 10 Careers Google Classroom (classwork section) that will also be of assistance.

#### Junior Campus Careers – Year 9 Morrisby Assessment and Interview

The Morrisby Careers assessment is designed to give students a detailed analysis of their suitability for various Careers and also what subjects they should consider choosing in future years. During the second half of Term 2, Year 9 students from both Keilor and Niddrie will be undertaking their Morrisby testing. They will receive a one on one interview with a trained Careers Counsellor at the start of Term 3 to discuss their results and provide further advice for the future. Student feedback from this program has generally been very positive and we hope this is helpful to all Year 9 students.


#### Senior VCAL PDS - Virtual School Tour Project





The Corps also supports various projects, such as the military museum at the Repatriation Hospital, Heidelberg, where the Corps is based.

Items include an ammunition belt, water bottle and a slouch hat from the 8<sup>th</sup> Light Horse Regiment, all from WW1; a backpack worn by infantry in the field weighing approximately the full pack weight, a U.S. infantry helmet and a model Armoured Personnel Carrier of the type George drove, from the Vietnam War, and a field hat (known as a" giggle hat") from the Afghanistan war.

NAPLAN is a nationwide measure through which parents, teachers, schools, education authorities, governments and the broader community can determine whether or not young Australians are developing the literacy and numeracy skills that provide the critical foundation for other learning and for their productive and rewarding participation in the community.

NAPLAN results allow parents/carers and educators to see how students are progressing in literacy and numeracy over time – individually, as part of their school community, and against national standards.

The tests provide an important contribution to monitoring and evaluating the performance of schools and school systems in these fundamental capabilities. They also provide schools, states and territories with information about how education approaches are working, the areas to be prioritised for improvement, and those schools requiring support in the teaching and learning of literacy and numeracy.

The results can assist teachers by providing additional information to support their professional judgement about students' levels of literacy and numeracy attainment and progress.

NAPLAN tests are one aspect of each school's assessment and reporting process and do not replace the extensive, ongoing assessments made by teachers about each student's performance. Each teacher will have the best insight into their students' educational progress. Parents/carers can use NAPLAN reports, along with other school assessment reports, to discuss their child's strengths and areas for improvement with their teacher.


